

2011 ANNUAL REPORT

2011 was a year of transition, growth and financial success for the Gardiner Museum.

At the beginning of the year Chief Curator Charles Mason resigned to accept another position and Dr. Peter Kaellgren, Curator Emeritus at the Royal Ontario Museum, joined the Gardiner Museum as our Interim Chief Curator to help facilitate a seamless transition in curatorial leadership.

The Gardiner Museum decided to hire two curators rather than a single chief curator as a curatorial team would provide the expertise needed to address the breadth of our permanent collections and support an active exhibition schedule. This approach was deemed the best way forward as it also provides the benefit of having two talented curators who can grow with and within the institution.

Senior Curator Rachel Gotlieb joined the Gardiner Museum in May 2011, and after a lengthy search the Museum hired Curator Karine Tsoumis in the first quarter of 2012. Rachel is an expert in Canadian craft and design, and has established a strong national reputation given her high profile career as a freelance curator. She is also the recipient of numerous awards including the Ontario Crafts Council Jean Johnson Curatorial Award (2008) for *On the Table: 100 Years of Functional Ceramics in Canada* which she curated with Dr. Sandra Alfoldy for the Gardiner Museum in 2007. Karine specializes in the study of the visual and material culture of Early Modern Europe. She curated *Family Matters: Love, Marriage and Maiolica in the Italian Renaissance* for the Gardiner Museum in 2010.

In 2011 the Gardiner Museum supported its ambition to be a centre of excellence for Canadian ceramics by accepting the Raphael Yu collection of Canadian ceramics, and his commitment to create a designated endowment fund which will allow the Gardiner to collect Canadian ceramics and create programs that celebrate this material in perpetuity. To recognize Mr. Yu for his generosity the Gardiner Museum created The Raphael Yu Centre of Canadian Ceramics, a virtual

destination at the Gardiner Museum and the rubric under which all activity related to Canadian ceramic art will be organized.

The Gardiner Museum presented four exhibitions in 2011, including *The Tsars' Cabinet* which featured Imperial Russian porcelain from the Kathleen Durdin Collection. The Gardiner Museum enhanced this travelling exhibition by including historic photographs of the Romanovs from the Di Rocco Wieler Collection.

The success of *The Tsars' Cabinet* helped the Gardiner Museum to exceed its paid admission objectives by 10%.

In 2011 the Gardiner Museum developed and launched a new web site and e-museum, a fully relational database that gives the public access to our permanent collections via gardinermuseum.com. In addition, the Gardiner Museum invested in a new digital marketing strategy.

Our Digital Marketing Strategy, as well as a commitment to work with other cultural organizations to develop programs that appeal to a diverse audience with broad interests, allowed the Gardiner Museum to increase program attendance by 50%.

Audience growth and a commitment to cost containment allowed the Gardiner to generate a surplus in 2011.

As a result of exemplary Board leadership, an extremely and uniformly dedicated staff, a loyal group of volunteers, members, donors and committed government partners, 2011 was an extraordinary year for the Gardiner Museum.

We are grateful to everyone who contributed to our success, and are committed to maintaining the momentum that your support has made possible for this uniquely focused Canadian museum.

EXHIBITION SUMMARY

Feature Exhibitions on view in George R. Gardiner Exhibition Gallery

BETTY WOODMAN PLACES, SPACES & THINGS

March 3 – June 5, 2011

Places, Spaces & Things was curated by Patterson Sims and is the first major exhibition of Woodman's work in Canada. It featured a selection of Woodman's painted ceramics and wall installations from the past 20 years of her career including a group of 50 porcelain vessels that were created by Woodman during multiple residencies at the Sevres Factory in France between 1987 and 2009. *Places, Spaces & Things* also included a number of largescale painted ceramic vessels and several of Woodman's monumental canvas and ceramic painting installations.

JUN KANEKO

June 30 – September 18, 2011

Jun Kaneko was organized by Smith Kramer Fine Art Services for a tour of North America. The Gardiner Museum was the only scheduled Canadian venue for this traveling exhibition. Featuring a mix of large and small ceramic sculptures as well as a selection of paintings and drawings Jun Kaneko was designed to illustrate Kaneko's strong command of form and colour, and his longstanding interest in optics and perception.



THE TSARS' CABINET THE LUXURY AND ROMANCE OF THE ROMANOVS

October 13, 2011 – January 8, 2012

The Tsars' Cabinet was organized by the Muscarelle Museum of Art at the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, Virginia. The Gardiner Museum was the only scheduled Canadian venue for this travelling exhibition.

The Tsars' Cabinet featured a selection of imperial Russian porcelain and decorative arts drawn from the Kathleen Durdin Collection to illustrate the majesty and luxury of imperial Russian culture during the Romanov reign. The Gardiner Museum enhanced The Tsars' Cabinet by including images of the Romanovs from the Di Rocco Weiler Collection as well as objects that belonged to Grand Duchess Olga, the Tsar's sister, who spent the final decades of her life in Toronto. CREAMWARE

August 3, 2011 – February 5, 2012

This exhibition showcased a collection of creamwares that were donated to the Gardiner Museum in 2008 by long-time members Jean and Ken Laundy. It was the first time many of the objects were publicly displayed.

NEW ACQUISITIONS

The Gardiner Museum made a number of significant acquisitions in 2011.

Raphael Yu donated an extraordinary collection of contemporary Canadian ceramics to the Gardiner, and made an irrevocable planned gift to create an endowment which will allow the Gardiner to collect Canadian ceramics and create programs that celebrate this material in perpetuity.

This gift will elevate the Gardiner's already impressive collection to be among the best collections of contemporary Canadian ceramics in the world. It is also aligned with the Museum's commitment to feature work by Canadian artists in its permanent and special exhibition galleries, and to involve living artists in its education programs. The Yu Collection documents what Canadian ceramics have achieved over the past three decades. It contains important work by some of the finest Canadian ceramic artists made throughout their careers.

The Gardiner Museum established The Raphael Yu Centre of Canadian Ceramics to acknowledge the generosity of Raphael Yu. The Raphael Yu Centre of Canadian Ceramics is a virtual destination at the Gardiner Museum and the rubric under which all activity related to Canadian ceramic art will be organized. The core activities of the Yu Centre include the collection, research, publication and exhibition of Canadian ceramics, as well as programs that feature Canadian artists and/or their work.

Other acquisition highlights include:

Bill and Molly Anne Macdonald built on the already extraordinary collection of Japanese and Japaneseinfluenced European porcelain that they have donated to the Gardiner by gifting an exquisite Matsugatani Dish with Gourd and a Ko-Imari Flask to the Museum in 2011.

Alan Mandell donated a beautiful work by American artist Betty Woodman, and Gardiner Museum trustees Laura Dinner and Karen Sheriff donated Manga Ormolu Version 5.0-I by Brendan Tang to the Museum last year. In addition, Quebec artist Leopold Foulem donated his piece Blue Boy and the Colonel Te Hua Spill Vase to the Museum and Canadian artist Ann Mortimer donated an important piece by Lucie Rie last year.

EDUCATION PROGRAM SUMMARY

SCHOOL PROGRAMS

Integrating collection-based gallery visits with hands-on art experience, a typical school visit includes a gallery tour with a potter or an educator and a hands-on clay class taught by a professional ceramic artist.

OPEN CLAY STUDIO

Wednesday and Friday Night and Sunday Afternoon: The Museum's clay studios are available to individuals on Wednesday and Friday evenings and Sunday afternoons. Wednesdays and Fridays are intended for adults, and Sunday afternoons are aimed at families. With the guidance of two professional potters, participants create their own clay works and, for a small fee, they can leave their work to be fired. Admittance is first-come, first served. The atmosphere is casual and fun.

FAMILY DAYS

The Gardiner Museum maintained its commitment to offer free programs with admission (children under 12 get in free) for families. The programs offered include crafts, hands-on activities, music and refreshments. Family Day is supported by Bruce Etherington & Associates and Scotia Bank.

CLAY CAMPS & CLASSES

In 2011 the Museum offered a one week March Break Program and week long summer camps in July and August. Individual children and teenagers populate the regular camp sessions. In addition, single camp days are scheduled for group bookings from daycares, community living associations and outpatient clinics. The Museum's March Break Program is supported generously by Thomas A. & Georgina T. Russo Family Foundation.

COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

The Gardiner Museum works with social service organizations such as the Barbra Schlifer Clinic to provide ceramic studio art experiences, or art therapy, to survivors of violence, homeless women, isolated seniors, and sexually abused children. Professional ceramic artists from the Museum work with art therapists, counselors and social workers and often translators over multiple sessions. The sessions culminate in an exhibition with a reception where the participants speak openly about their relationship to their art experience and its place in their recovery.

LECTURES AND EVENTS

In 2011 the Museum offered a full schedule of programs and events. Highlights include:

CUMMING CERAMIC RESEARCH FOUNDATION LECTURE

Helen Delacretaz, Chief Curator, Winnipeg Art Gallery, delivered the 2011 Cumming Ceramic Research Foundation lecture. Ms. Delacretaz spoke about the influence of Islamic decorative arts on late 19th century English Ceramics.

HELEN E. GARDINER LECTURE

Presented by Stephen Brown and Brenda Woods and supported by the Helen E. Gardiner Endowment Fund. Dr. Peter Kaellgren, Curator Emeritus at the Royal Ontario Museum delivered the 2011 Helen E. Gardiner lecture. Dr. Kaellgren s' talk was entitled *Catherine the Great: The Empress of China*.

MICHAEL IGNATIEFF

Canadian writer and historian, Michael Ignatieff, is the author of The Russian Album and is a Senior Resident at Massey College. He told a story about survival, memory, exile and the creation of new meanings in a new world using some of the objects that his family carried into exile after the Russian Revolution: a silver jug and a piece of jewellery.

EDMUND DE WAAL

Author of the bestselling memoir, *The Hare with Amber Eyes* and one of the best known ceramic artists working today, Edmund de Waal lectured at the Gardiner Museum. A small installation of his recent work was on view to complement his presentation.



EMPTY BOWLS

The Museum gives back to the community by hosting an annual fundraising event that brings chefs, potters and Gardiner Museum Members together to support the homeless in Toronto by contributing to Anishnawbe Health Toronto and their street patrol.

NUIT BLANCHE

The Gardiner Museum partnered with Soundstreams to celebrate the $100^{\rm th}$ birthday of John Cage throughout this 12 hour event.



TWELVE TREES OF CHRISTMAS

The Gardiner Museum officially kicks off the holiday season in Toronto with the festive Twelve Trees of Christmas gala and exhibition. Trees created by some of this city's most talented designers attract children of all ages and backgrounds to the Gardiner, and then help to spread the Christmas spirit throughout the city as many are donated to charities.
